The Future Gardeners scheme aims to provide horticultural training to people who have been long-term unemployed, or who have faced challenges in their lives, and benefit from gaining confidence, skills and the opportunity of training and employment.

What is Future Gardeners?

Developed by prominent organisations in the industry, including Bankside Open Spaces Trust (BOST), The Worshipful Company of Gardeners, The Royal Parks Guild and Walworth Garden, the course now works in partnership with numerous other organisations to ensure its success.

Participants are given the opportunity to gain the skills they need to be work-ready and get an entry level horticultural job or go onto further training in the industry. Although the course is suited to a wide variety of people, it targets those with the most need, such as people not in education or training, the long-term unemployed, those who cannot afford other horticultural courses, and people who have learning needs or disabilities.

The course is practically focused and includes the following:

- A City and Guilds qualification in Practical Horticultural Level 2 at Walworth Garden.
- · Practical experience in BOST community parks and gardens.
- Work experience with horticultural industry leaders including Royal Parks Greenwich, Chelsea Physic Garden, Crown Estates Paving Commission, Kew Gardens, Frognal Gardens, Maylim and Willerby Landscapes.
- Research visits and workdays with outside organisations in the horticultural sector: Chiswick House and Gardens, Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) Garden Wisley, Kew Gardens, National Trust's Morden Hall, Fulham Palace House & Garden and Horatio's Garden in Stanmore.
- Horticultural industry expert talks to inspire students about their future careers.
- CV building, help with applying for jobs and interview techniques to ensure students are work-ready once they complete the course.
- One-to-one individually tailored mentoring and support aimed at building confidence.

The need for Future Gardeners

- The shortage of skilled professionals entering the horticultural industry in the UK has now been deemed 'critical' by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS). This is due to three factors: the current ageing workforce, lack of apprentices going into the industry at entry level and difficulties in recruiting for skilled vacancies.
- With the OHRG predicting that the skills shortage will seriously restrict future business growth and with horticulture contributing over £9 billion to the UK economy each year, there are sound economic reasons to address this skills shortage. (The 2019 Horticulture Sector Skills Survey undertaken by Pye Tait for the Ornamental Horticultural Roundtable Group (OHRG)).
- Unemployment can affect mental health, confidence and self-esteem as well as lead to debt and poor physical health. A study from 2017 (BBC) showed that if you are young and unemployed you are more than twice as likely to have mental health needs. At the same time there is a need for horticulture to be presented as an accessible (no barriers to entry), fulfilling career choice to many who may not have thought of it as being an option for them, especially those who have limited or no qualifications and who would prefer to have a career outdoors. Horticulture is an accessible, healthy and fulfilling career option for those looking for a change from indoor jobs, or those who have not yet achieved the qualifications to begin a career. There are a wide variety of opportunities from garden design, landscaping, floristry, arboriculture and tree maintenance, plant propagation and growing, working in nurseries and garden centres to maintaining sports pitches and golf courses, the list goes on...



The programme

City and Guilds Level 2 Award in Work-Based Horticulture

The course at Walworth Garden covered the following:

- Plant nomenclature, terminology and identification
- · Establishing propagation material
- · Maintaining plants outdoors
- Monitoring and maintaining health and safety
- Maintaining and developing personal performance
- Establishing and maintaining effective working relationships with others
- Preparing the ground for seeding and planting
- · Establishing plants and seeds in soil
- Maintaining the appearance of decorative amenity areas
- · Maintaining equipment and machines

With Project Manager Louisa Mansfield at Bankside Open Spaces Trust (BOST), the students learned the theory and practice of:

- General garden maintenance at local community gardens
- · Working at local BOST sites
- · Learning to identify weeds
- · Identification of trees in the local area

Employment mentoring

Future Gardeners Project Manager Louisa Mansfield supported students with careers advice and employability skills. The aim is that all students have an up-to-date gardening CV and are confident in both applying for jobs and attending interviews by the end of the course.

The students were helped in their employment journey with a mixture of presentations, workshops and a weekly 'Job Club'.

Held outside of the class, the club offers 1-2-1 help with whatever the students need in their job search. In the post course survey carried out, 100% of respondents who had attended Job Club said it was useful for updating their CV.

All students were also introduced to Fresh Horticultural Careers – a specialist recruitment agency for the garden maintenance, landscaping and horticulture industries throughout the UK – and were assisted in registering for both permanent and temporary jobs.



Garden research visits

RHS Garden Wisley

Future Gardeners Programmes Manager Louisa Mansfield successfully applied for a bursary from the RHS to continue trips with each of the cohorts of students to RHS Garden Wisley.

For the summer and spring visits the students went to Wisley for the day and had the chance to meet with current apprentices, look round the gardens and find out more about the work of the RHS. The Royal Parks Guild Apprentice and Trainee Discovery Day at RHS Garden, Wisley - Wednesday 28th September 2022


People, Places and Plants -The importance of green spaces to health and wellbeing.

Future Gardeners 15 were invited by The Royal Parks Guild to attend the annual apprentice and trainee day which was being held at RHS Wisley as part of their course. The day was for exploration of the benefits of green spaces to people's health and wellbeing and was held at the new RHS Hilltop building opened in June 2021. The students were able to participate in activities designed to assess their connection with plants, places and planet and the impact this

would have on their wellbeing and wellbeing of others. 
Success of Future Gardeners

During the 2022-23 year, 34 students enrolled and 25 completed the course, a completion rate of 71%.

64% of those who have completed the course have now gone into employment or further training in the industry. Employers include Frognal Gardens, Willerby Landscapes, The Horniman Museum, Bankside Open Spaces Trust and Greenwich Park.

Impact evaluation

At the beginning and end of each course students are asked to complete an anonymous survey about their current levels of physical activity and fitness as well as their sense of life satisfaction, happiness, self-confidence, being appreciated, connection to nature, community belonging, anxiety and loneliness.

100% of students reported improved feelings in each of the areas. The biggest improvement reported was with increased connection to nature followed by decreased anxiety and decreased loneliness.

When thinking about impact statements:


100% agreed or strongly agreed they have more knowledge of plants and gardening. 100% agreed or strongly agreed their gardening abilities had improved.

86% agreed or strongly agreed they were more aware of environmental issues. **64%** agreed or strongly agreed they felt prouder of where they live and work.

64% agreed or strongly agreed they had more friends.

77% agreed or strongly agreed their self-confidence had increased.

75% agreed or strongly agreed they were better able to communicate with others. 77% agreed or strongly agreed they were better at working as part of a team.



96% of respondents said they intend to pursue a career in horticulture

Aims for Future Gardeners

After the success of seven years of Future Gardeners there is both the need and the demand to develop and expand the scheme. In order to realise this aim. Bankside **Open Spaces Trust and** The Worshipful Company of Gardeners are delighted that Future Gardeners has recently become a charity in its own right (Charity Number 1191623). This will give us the opportunity to generate more funding opportunities and to grow the programme.

Our targets and impact proposals going forward are:

- Running three Future Gardener courses per year in Waterloo, central London. There will be 14 participants per course, three courses per year, enabling 42 people per year to benefit from the course.
- Out of the 34 students who are expected to complete the course per year, assuming an 80% completion rate, we aim to support 80% of these participants into jobs in the horticultural industry. This will be a total of 27 students per year going into careers in the industry.
- Expand the operational capacity of Bankside
 Open Spaces Trust to be able to deliver in-house
 City and Guilds Horticultural Qualifications to
 all students.
- Expand the programme to additional London boroughs and also to other cities in the UK, including but not limited to Glasgow, Belfast and Leeds.
